
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Out of the Shadows



It is in instances such as this where I often wonder if we're living in one ourselves, as it is the nature of such a thing to delude those who dwell in them.

While climate change may be a real and pressing cause, we cannot compromise on an unbiased conclusion in the name of efficiency and fast action. This kind of premise constructs the basis for dictatorships and totalitarianism. Only when we consider every point of view and share them with the people of our world, can we really call ourselves a democracy.
