Message from The Chairman, IPSS



Dear Fellow Doscos,

Much has happened since my last message on this forum and at the IPSS. We are working on several

fronts to make our School truly future-ready and relevant for the needs and challenges of the 21st century. We wish to continue the great work that is ongoing and bring in new initiatives in a chosen few areas.

Today, academic prowess strongly influences and shapes careers. Therefore, academics is being hardwired into the School's plans so that it meets the needs of all the board exam systems. Faculty members are making interventions in specific subjects where it is possible and necessary to raise the bar. They are also being supported—both in pedagogy and in a pastoral role—through a mix of training, coaching and counselling. This is expected to help them improve effectivity and constantly update their own skills.

There is greater focus on upgradation and maintenance of School infrastructure; this is allowing students and faculty to optimally use various assets and facilities.

Many of the projects under the School's current development plan are complete, and we are in the process of preparing a blueprint up to 2030.

While we have been the best school in India for a long time, as Old Boys, we essentially have two expectations of our alma mater: first, that The Doon School becomes an 'elite', needs-blind institution which attracts the best talent from around the country, irrespective of background; and second, our School features in the list of the best institutions, anywhere in the

world. To fulfil such aspirations, we must be able to raise resources imaginatively, purposefully and passionately.

To oversee fundraising on behalf of the Board of Governors of the IPSS, I took on the role of the Fundraising Committee last year from Ravi Bulchandani. I want to thank him for his efforts. The Committee has since been expanded, providing our mission more ballast. The ongoing Development Plan seeks an endowment corpus of Rs 120 crores by 2020. We are at the halfway stage; besides, more than half this amount is allocated to endowments, which means only the interest income portion can be deployed.

Our fund-raising plan rests on three pillars:

- Securing the commitment of IPSS members to contribute larger sums which get aggregated towards the Scholarships Fund.
- Offering naming rights, along with specified amounts and time periods, for supporting and building various facilities.
- Reaching out to corporations, trusts and family foundations who can partner our scholarship initiative, and to augment infrastructure, such as the new Indoor Sports Complex and the new Science Labs or the renovation of Kashmir, Hyderabad and Tata House, etc.


Increasing needs-based scholarships are a key priority. In the past year, full scholarships have been awarded to three meritorious students from SOS villages. The Fundraising Committee has also approved grants for students from an Armed Forces background - with complete waiver of registration fee, and the top five candidates will receive 50% scholarships.

Currently, around a seventh of the boys receive some form of financial aid; and we clearly need to raise the bar in terms of scale, scope and diversity. Towards this, the Diversity Committee under Alok Bhargava is working closely with the IPSS and the DSOBS to reach out to potential parents from different socioeconomic and geographic backgrounds.

You would also be pleased to learn that various upgradation projects are progressing smoothly, and I'd like to thank and appreciate the DSOBS for their active and passionate support in raising funds for Kashmir, Hyderabad & Tata House. Other renovation projects are in different stages of execution.

I will share more details of ongoing initiatives as we go along; in the meantime, as always, we are counting on your continued support.

Message from the Head Master



The 2017-18 school year has been one of action and renewed connections amongst the school and the fraternity as we have both worked nationally and

internationally with the board's new Diversity Committee. In order to fulfill our mission to attract and develop exceptional boys from all backgrounds to serve a meritocratic India, the board asked Alok Bhargava to develop a committee that would be able to raise awareness of the places and the financial aid available to boys from new and underrepresented regions.

Alok has enthusiastically, and with considerable charm, assembled a group of passionate old boys and parents to come with him to the very corners of the region to spread the word. By combining DSOBS events with the drive for diversity we have been able to bring more people together than usual. Together with Alok, Bull and the other officers in the Secretariat and Executive Committee have worked incredibly hard to make this a very successful year for the community and for diversity.

In the admission cycle for April 2018 we had 321 students take the tests and 200 joined the group interviews for 93 places. Amongst them were boys from 23 states and 5 countries other than India. This allowed us to start the year with representation from 26 states and 7 countries. The interviews took us to Calcutta, Hyderabad and Bombay and we had some lovely DSOBS events in the cities to connect over a drink and bite in the evenings.

Then we travelled to Kathmandu in February to start off our Diversity Initiative, followed by Madras, Bangalore and Hyderabad again in March. In the summer there was a trip to London that was followed by Baroda and

Ahmedabad before heading to San Francisco and New York. The cities in Gujarat were new for some of us and the turn out from the press and the families interested in the school was wonderful; much credit to our hosts Samarjit Gaekwad '86 and Yash Gandhi '07. San Francisco has not had a formal gathering for five years and what we thought would be a party for 80 turned into a party of 125. In both San Francisco and New York it was wonderful to see people from the 1950s batches rubbing shoulders with our latest graduates and taking them under their wings. In the coming year we will be heading to Srinagar, Guwahati and Coimbatore.

In New York the regional group of the Fundraising Committee met to talk about the approach that we will be taking to the growth of the endowment fund for scholarships. The desire to reach a position where we are able to fund 40% of our students through endowed scholarships is one that is shared by many of the great schools around the world. On a recent visit to Canada I learned that the numbers we are looking at to do the job are exactly what two of that countries most prominent schools have also set as targets and shared with their committees; we are in good company.

As well as the effort to attract a more diverse pool of applicants by travelling, we have been working directly with two target groups who bring geographical, cultural and socioeconomic diversity; the Armed Forces and the SOS Children's Villages.

By offering five additional scholarships of 50% of fees to the top five candidates that come through the admissions tests who are armed forces children and by waiving the registration fees for them, we have increased registrations ten fold from this demographic.

By going out to visit the Director of Education for the SOS Villages, and seeing a couple of their excellent schools in action, we have received 14 applications for the three full scholarships that we are offering them. Having had SOS children from India living and studying with me when I worked at the Pearson UWC in Canada, I know just what a contribution they can make. I was even more delighted to learn that one of the people behind the foundation of the SOS Children's Villages was none other than Khalid Baig's mother, Tara Ali Baig; that feels like a circle being completed.

Dear Fellow Doscos,

A year has flown by, and am delighted to apprise you of the numerous developments that have

been planned and those, which have been undertaken at Chandbagh since last Founders.

To begin with, I would like to convey a very warm welcome to Mr Sunil Kant Munjal, Chairman of the Board of Governors, who has agreed to Chair the Fundraising Committee at the behest of Mr Ravi Bulchandani and many others. The Committee has been further expanded since last year.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have invested in The Doon School's future. Your support is transforming the lives of current pupils and those of generations to come. Giving has been an integral part of our school that has supported a wide array of projects including the provision of scholarships. Scholarships ensure that talented boys from a range of different backgrounds have the opportunity to fulfil their potential. In the last academic year the school was able to provide scholarships to the tune of Rs. 3.81 crores, which helped 15% of the 569 students with an average student receiving 45% aid.

You will be delighted to read about the two named scholarships, which have been added this year. One of the scholarships would support students from public sector backgrounds, and the other one is a first of its kind – to support a student who shows proficiency in cricket.


Work is under way to upgrade facilities in Kashmir, Hyderabad and Tata Houses. I would like to thank The Doon School Old Boys' Society for taking on the mantle to support this initiative.

Some of the planned developments we have on the cards are that of the Chemistry Block which would now make way for Design & Technology. The new Chemistry Labs would be moved into the Biology Block (for those who haven't visited in decades – near the Old Music School). These labs promise to be something worth a visit. Most of the fixtures will need to be imported, as Indian vendors continue to design labs like the ones we had. The new labs aim to provide a learning environment that is modern; at par with the leading institutions and where the class and lab work can be planned concurrently. Work has also commenced on the Indoor Sports Complex.

Special thanks is also due to the Old Boys who have provided opportunities for students to Intern in their offices. Students in S & Sc forms are encouraged to spend two to three weeks to gain exposure to real work environments in their areas of interest. Please do let us know if you would be interested in providing such opportunities.

As you can see we have had a full house and certainly an exciting one. Please feel free to reach out to me – next time you visit town and would like to visit your school, or if you want to support the development of Chandbagh!



Bridge the gap

Hyderabad & Kashmir Houses Renovation Project

As The Doon School gears itself up to keep abreast with the world's leading academic institutions, the infrastructure on campus is simultaneously being reinforced across different areas.

Hyderabad and Kashmir houses are in the midst of an expansive renovation. The total cost envisaged for all the listed developments is Rs. 11 crores. From the donations received to date, a major part has been already spent on the renovations, but there is still a large deficit to cover. H & K old boys are requested to come forward and rally this worthy cause.

New Roofing

The iconic red slanted tin roof - the largest roof in School, across both houses is under a large-scale renovation.

The roof consists of two parts - the cemented flat section in the front that has been water-proofed and repaired in its entirety across the length and breadth. The second part is the red metal sheeting that has to be fully replaced along with original deodar trusses on which it is supported and anchored. Once completed, the roof will be good for many generations to safely sleep under.

New Composite Study-Sleep Units

The traditional toyes for the ISC boys are now giving way to the modern concept of providing a functional study table within the rooms - that come equipped with additional storage in the bed boxes and racks, pin boards and an electrical point for recharging laptops. Painted walls, muted aesthetics and new flooring complete the transformation.

Common Room with Extra Comforts

The common rooms have been for generations the focal point of relaxation. Now there's more reason to chill as they have been equipped with pantries - feeling hungry now means DIY eggs rather than bust bounds. Add to that a digital TV to watch the Men in Blue demolish the world, and musical instruments to strum the next big hit.

Indoor Sports Complex Project

The Doon School, as part of its constant endeavour to continue offering a world class education has consistently focused on improving and expanding its physical infrastructure and educational facilities.

Towards this end the school has upgraded its classrooms in the Main Building, are in the process of making world class science laboratories, have recently concluded a new masters housing block and various improvements of the five boys' houses are constantly being worked upon.

To further enhance the quality of education that the school offers and its commitment to lessons learnt both inside the classrooms and outside, the school has decided to both renovate and enhance its current sports infrastructure.

Located in close proximity to the three boarding houses of Hyderabad, Kashmir

and Oberoi, the new sports facility builds on the synergies it can establish with existing sporting infrastructure such as the swimming pool and the adjoining Skinners sports field.

Specifically, by building a sports hall that can accommodate in addition to two indoor basketball courts, four squash courts and rooms for weights, aerobics and a multipurpose room for activities such as yoga, dance or gymnastics, the building would allow boys to have the opportunity of either being proficient in multiple sport or excelling in one.

Unlike traditional indoor sports halls that allow for multiple uses, but not concurrently, the new facility would allow for the simultaneous use of its multiple facilities. For example while boys play basketball on one court, four other

practice, while other teams warm up at the gym before moving to either the swimming pool or the squash courts. With flexibility being in built into the building, it would adapt to the future needs of the school, these may or may not necessarily be limited to sporting events only. Retractable seating, moveable partition walls and day lighting strategies would support this endeavour.

The sports complex defines the eastern edge of the school's campus. Away from public view it creates a large vehicular free landscaped zone in the space between the rear of Hyderabad and Kashmir House and the new building.

This court, acts as a precursor to the sports facility in a manner similar to the gardens that flank the Main building. A combination of pergolas and outdoor gym equipment would ensure that the space has both social purpose and landscape value.

A central space that serves as both a student commons and a foyer connects

the pedestrian only landscape court to a vehicular entrance at the opposite side. Two square courtyards along with clerestory windows bring natural light deep into the space.

Identifiable by a set of bleachers, between the two courtyards, they provide theatre style seating for instruction on sport technique and the projection of educational content. Below the bleachers are stores and offices for coaches along with other ancillary functions such as a sports library. Behind them and overlooking the existing swimming pool are the glass faced weights, aerobics and multi-purpose rooms.

A second vehicular entrance to the facility can be accessed by visiting teams from other schools. A dormitory has been provided for those visiting from outside Dehra Dun as has a separate and secure entrance into the swimming facility.

In keeping with the schools commitment to the environment, the building is envisioned to be environmentally friendly



and ecologically sustainable. The courtyards for example allow the low winter sun to penetrate into the building while trellises, covered arcades and overhangs protect the building from a harsh summer sun and it's associated heat gain.

Naturally ventilated through operable windows in the dominant wind direction, provisions are made for hot air to escape and a future solar power installation.

Extensive north glazing not only opens up views to the Mussouri hills but also floods the space with glare free natural light.

The new facility builds on the schools tradition of preparing students for roles of responsibility and leadership. As an all year, all weather facility it further re affirms the schools commitment to lessons learnt both in and outside the classroom while enabling a degree of flexibility in the organising the boys timetable.

Armed Forces Scholarship

In order to achieve our mission, it is essential to establish a microcosm of the diversity the country has to offer. It is important to us that we attract exceptional students from all parts of our country and all walks of life whether they are farmers, businessmen, armed forces personnel, bureaucrats, professional managers, nurses, dentists, engineers, actors, public servants and everything in between.

It gives me great pleasure to inform you that as a mark of respect to our armed forces The Doon School has committed to undertake the following initiatives for the sons of Armed Forces personal.

The school has waived the registration fee which allows the students to appear for the entrance exam.

• The school will provide a 50% grant on the annual fee to the top 5 students who are successful in securing admission to the school on merit.

• The grant is not limited to 50% and can be extended for meritorious students, who can apply for a needsbased scholarship in accordance with our Financial Aid Policy, which is based on the income of the parents.

If there are more than five students who may be eligible to join, then the top five on merit will get the 50% grant and the rest can apply for needsbased scholarships

boys from all backgrounds will find a place here. There has been a perception that the school is not within the reach of the services, to eliminate that letter was written to all three services headquarters and the scholarships defined. There were visits made to few units and the information was disseminated across the country through military dispatch. There has been an overwhelming response and we wish the trend continues with the guidance and support of the fraternity.







Renovation of the Science Labs

Dear Doscos,

After many years we have decided to completely renovate and modernize the Science Laboratories.

Presently, the Biology, Chemistry and Physics/IT labs are located in three separate

buildings with the Biology Lab building accommodating the Design and Technology Centre and Foreign Language Labs.

These Labs are very old and were last renovated more than twenty years ago. To keep up with current technological and design changes and teaching techniques, we now need to completely renovate them.

We have planned to allow the three experimental sciences to be accommodated in two rather than three buildings, which will allow Biology and Chemistry to share common preparation and teaching resources.

The new Chemistry Laboratory will be located on the first floor of the present Biology Building whilst the new Biology Lab will be created at the present location on the ground floor. The Design and Technology Centre will be relocated from the lower ground floor of the current Biology Lab building to the current Chemistry Lab building and the Foreign Language classrooms will occupy the lower ground floor of this building. The Physics and IT building will house the new Physics and Computer Science/IT labs and classrooms.

After renovation, the walls and floors would be the same as the renovated classrooms in the Main Building without the acoustic treatment with Antistatic vinyl flooring.

The new concept in these laboratories will be to have Teaching and Lab work in the same room with flexibility in furniture and arrangements ('movable work stations') that will allow different approaches to Teaching, Mobility and Proximity of the Teacher. Apart from bringing in more comprehensive academic work flow and set up, these changes would allow the Design and Technology and the Art School to be in a more coherent space. There will also be a common public space.

In Phase One of this project, it is proposed to complete the Chemistry Laboratory during the winter vacations 2018-2019. The Second Phase will consist of renovating the Chemistry Lab building into a Design and Technology Centre and renovating the Lower Ground Floor/Basement of the Biology Lab building into a Foreign Language Classrooms cum Science Resource Centre. The Second Phase should be completed by 2019-2020. The final Phase 3 will then comprise of Renovating the Biology Lab and complete Physics Lab/IT Centre and this is expected to be complete in 2020-2021.

The new generation of Doscos can now look forward to beautiful new laboratories at par with the best in the world.

Knowledge Our Light

To first address an august, measured and vastly varied body, such as The Doon School Old Boys' Society is a daunting task, knowing fully well ones

writing must stand scrutiny else willynilly even dear old friends will gleefully rip it to shreds. However, since there is no walking it back, here goes.

Folks,

That another year in the life of our exceptional Alumni Society is before us and that we continue to remain relevant to both eighteen and eighty year olds alike speaks volumes for the common language we ingest in our five or six year residence in the Chandbagh; or our variation of "you can check out... but you can never leave."

When Doon opened in 1935 it was seeded in a time of great change in India. Will Durant had just published "A case for India" and had laid before every educated Indian that in the last 50 years over 30 million Indians had starved to death, not because not enough food was grown in India, but because the farmers that grew the food were taxed so extortionately they could not afford to buy the very food they grew. The massacre of Jalianwala Bagh, the perpetrator, Gen. Dyer's, subsequent exoneration was fresh in their minds and the footsteps of the Dandi Salt March still reverberated across India.

Into this mix came Arthur Foot, a young idealistic man, all of thirty-five years.

Over 80 years have passed since Foot's enlightened concept of a fledgling-school's Alumni growing, in time, into 'An Aristocracy... of Service'. No sooner were the words written than this fragile barque

was launched upon the tumultuous sea of time, committing our Alumni in eternity to this wonderful egalitarian ideal. Since then class after class of our Alumni are told, Indians with a background of privilege, have a duty of service, initially to their future free nation, and later as free men to their nation.

And now we have this covenant, which we as a fraternity have kept in no small measure. As I cast my mind about me, I see innumerable older Doscos that have walked that promise, kept in the shade and if called to account will acquit themselves more than honorably. Today, in a sensation before substance world, we must call to them to step out into the garden.

The Doon School exists as a leap of faith, one of trust, its governance and its very existence entrusted to us, the Alumni, by the Founders. It is left to us, with the simple direction, to see if we, the alumni, find value in the education we receive, and if we do we "pay it forward", we send our sons back here, we add our bricks to its edifice, and leave it for the next generation.

There is muttering every now and again that it would be good to get a letter from School, which was not accompanied by a request for money. But here is the rub, dear friends, there is no wealthy benefactor for whom your school is a 'vanity project', there is only you, and you, old boy, are from where the buck comes and where it stops.

Today when we live in a 'Post Truth' and 'Alternate Facts' world beset by disruption and potentially catastrophic technological innovation; where increasingly the concentration of wealth is in the hands of very few and the chasm between rich and poor nations is accelerating, our Covenant of Service and the essential human qualities of trust, kindness, compassion and ethics, are more important than they have ever been. When there is barely a single ethically credible public figure, The Doon School's continued insistence on an ethical and egalitarian aspect to education is probably one of its most important contributions.

So you, young Dosco, when you look about you, and perhaps are a little discouraged, I would encourage you to look to Doscos in Industry such as Vikram Lal, Arun Bharatram, Darshan Singh, who do extensive, selfless, charitable work, Intellectuals such as Kanti Bajpai and Ramchandra Guha, Artists like Vivan Sundaram, liberal voices like Abhinandan Sekhri or Abhinav Kumar of the Indian Police Service all of whom interact with the real world to effect real change and simultaneously remain conscience keepers





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

The best news from the above, at least for those who have not noticed, is that the House has NO structural repair needs at all. It has truly lived up to its motto - True as Steel!


Whilst there are no time lines set out by The School, the Project could commence by the 3rd Quarter of 2019. We are free to influence the designs and specifications with her, which will then be agreed to by the School and we will probably be afforded the opportunity to oversee the pre-qualification of Contractors and Vendors, and the award of their contracts.


Works related to the provision of a Computer Room, Pantry, Plinth Protection and Storm Water Drainage have been recently completed at a cost of about Rs. 65 lacs. The cost of the main works will need to be calculated once the designs are approved but thumb rule estimates put it between Rs. 5 and 9 crores. The big difference is due to the potential of more work than can be seen by the naked eye on the roof.






