"Man is the only animal who refuses to be what he is"- Albert Camus

Reading that quote over and over again, it really struck me. We are, as I like to term it, "creatures of mystery". From the outside, we are everything under the sun. Whether we change into a "Rhinoceros", evolve to a "monstrous vermin", or be the reflection in the mirror, it doesn't matter. Quite literally, the smirks on our faces, the sarcastic nudges here and there, the long faces are everything we put on to get what we want and often, what we need. The degree to which we show our emotions is largely subjective, but at the crux, these faces don't reflect all that we are from the inside. The matter of the fact, however, is that we have always heard this ideology, right? The entire idea of the falsity of human beings is not new to us. Yet, this ability to look good on the outside and be different on the inside is hurting our community and its prevalence only hinders our progress.

Before I begin, I believe it is imperative for the community to understand that I do not intend to break down this "occurrence" and point fingers at certain institutions or individuals (for it is something we all inevitably do). While meeting someone for the first time, will you ever abuse that individual? Will you comment on his or her looks? No, right? Even if don't like the

person at a glance, morality steps in and forces you to take a step back. You simply greet the person and shake his/her hand, with the brightest smile you can put on. However, what disturbs me is the doomed ideology of "face value" in our community. To those of you not familiar with the idea, I call it the "collectively conceived" perspective of a person on the basis of how he/she presents themself. Think of it like a profile, or maybe a CV. As you achieve certain things, you add them to your profile. Be it your academic successes, sporting benchmarks or extracurricular achievements. People around you acknowledge you, criticise you, understand you, blame you, but at the end you have a holistic perspective of yourself from the world around you. So, what is the problem?

Let's put forward an example. Say, there is person called X. X takes pride in what he does and likes to tell people about them. X claims he is an excellent debater and an incredible badminton player. At this point of time, your brain registers these activities and begins to formulate an image of X. However, you don't affirm this impression fully, because of the lack of proof or even credibility to a certain extent. Now, say X goes to another person and tells him the same things. And another person and another person and slowly you will notice that a majority of the School believes that X is an excellent debater and badminton player, irrespective of whether they have any proof of X's being one. This, ladies and gentlemen, is the power of words. On the other hand, we have Y, who is an extremely talented individual, yet extremely shy and does not speak much. In comparison to X, very few people will know of Y's capabilities. In the long run, X has the edge over Y, simply because of how he presents himself to the outside world, irrespective of what he can really do or achieve.

This "occurrence" is extremely relevant in our community, simply because of the fact that we have individuals always achieving some feat or the other, and it becomes very tough for one individual to be highlighted and to build

Michael Cohen's Confession | Varen Talwar

On Tuesday, August 21, 2018, Michael Cohen shook the world by pleading guilty to committing campaign finance violations during Donald Trump's bid for presidency in 2016. He admitted to the fact that Donald Trump had instructed him to pay 'hush money' to the two ladies he had been indulging himself in-Stormy Daniels, an adult film star, and Karen McDougal, a Playboy model, to avoid a negative impact on Trump's publicity in the run up to the elections.

So, as you can see, this whole issue has been, much like Trump's presidency- overly dramatic. But the question arises, who is this Michael Cohen, who might have started the end of Trump's tenure?

Michael Cohen was the son of a Holocaust survivor who migrated to America to start a new life. As Cohen grew up, he began idolising Donald Trump, whom he considered a 'great' and 'successful' man. As Cohen grows up, he tried to associate himself with Trump. He moved with his family into an apartment in one of Trump's buildings, and also encouraged

Michael Cohen has since been one of Trump's closest confidantes-that is, until August 21, 2018. As Trump's personal lawyer, he defended Trump through thick and thin. However, when the FBI organised a raid in his office on April 9, 2018, things started to change, and Cohen was soon replaced by Rudy Giuliani in May.


Then, of course, came August 21, which saw Michael Cohen's life come to a standstill. He pleaded guilty to his charges, and testified positively to the involvement of Donald Trump in the campaign finance violations. Thus, not only did he reveal his own misdeeds, but also dragged along the American president and his campaign chairman, Paul Manafort. Manafort was found guilty of eight of the eighteen charges pressed on him, because of only one juror who prevented the conviction on ten counts.

So, what happens to Trump now? The Democrats are surprisingly

silent about Trump's impeachment. It is supposed that they are waiting for the midterm elections in November to do the talking. Trump, meanwhile, in his characteristically nonchalant manner, said that his impeachment would crash the stock market and felt that it was outrageous to impeach someone 'doing such a great job'.



Moreover, Cohen's lawyer, Lanny Davis, tweeted, "If those payments [to Daniels and McDougal] were a crime for Michael Cohen, then why wouldn't they be a crime for Donald Trump?" While these convictions are not related to any Russian involvement in the elections, Donald Trump may have to face impeachment, which, due to the seriousness and authenticity of Cohen's statements, does seem likely to me (despite Trump's questionable beliefs of the future).



The Dosco Cup, as an award, is not unique to our School. In fact, an award like the Dosco Cup exists in almost every public school whose ethos is structured on the spirit of the house system. Admittedly, schools today are undergoing a paradigm shift. However, there are certain aspects that are so deeply embedded in the system that their removal will only corrode the system. To me, the Dosco Cup exemplifies this line of thought.

My primary claim is based on the premise that a house is the pillar of a public school. The Dosco Cup is the culmination of the efforts put in by the boys involved in a wide array of activities that Doon has to offer. Since the cup takes into account a large number of activities, it cannot be won by individuals who contribute to just a few of them. This acts as a binding force, uniting the different elements of the house for a common incentive, which is the Dosco Cup. The award unites a footballer and a santoor player in a relationship which is based on mutual respect for each other's effort. This engenders a brotherhood which cements itself into a fraternity that School is highly acclaimed for. Discontinuing the Dosco Cup would deprive the School community of an important ingredient, which is denying Doon of perhaps its greatest strength.

My second claim alludes to the equality of activities in School. We are aware of the difference in our attitudes towards the slew of activities in School. There is a palpable difference in our enthusiasm for hockey and poetry. However, to cultivate an equal liking for all pursuits that a School can offer, there appears no better instrument than the Dosco Cup, where winning poetry would acquire as many points as winning hockey. Admittedly, a clear equality between the two activities is neither achievable nor feasible. However, in the absence of such a system, there would probably be no investment in the less popular activities. This may lead to a skewed level of engagement. If Doon has stood for anything, it is creating refined and all-rounded individuals who serve our nation.

Conclusively to sustain the principles School has stood for in the past, the Dosco Cup must remain. And we as the custodians of an 83-year old legacy have the duty of defending it.

Doscos look forward to Inter House Competitions with much anticipation and fervour. At times, the House spirit students exhibit surpasses the School spirit. The difference between the two is evident from the presence of spectators on a Sunday morning Cricket match and an Inter House football match. The Dosco Cup is essentially a culmination of all the Inter house competitions. Although we may display unswerving dedication towards an Inter House competition, there is also an underlying motive to win the Dosco Cup. There is significant importance which is given to Inter House competitions. The Dosco Cup only serves to further that, but at the expense of the due attention that should have recognised School team matches and events. The Inter House Competitions are indeed essential but their importance (which is only furthered by the Dosco Cup) can never supersede the relevance of School events.

Another important aspect of our curriculum is the Midterm expedition that we diligently undertake and the social service we do to the community. Both do not find themselves included as a part of the Dosco Cup. The Dosco Cup has merely boiled down to the visible achievements of a House and other essential yet intangible components go unnoticed.

Viewing the issue from a logistics perspective as well, in the Dosco Cup there is perceptible disparity in the weightage of different activities. Irrespective of the participation, every Inter House has the same weightage for the Dosco Cup. Owing to the larger number of sport competitions, this ensures that houses put in less effort into extra-curricular activities, as they are less important. And even if this issue is addressed, who would decide what weightage is to be given to an activity? Will it depend on the status of the activity or the participation that it seeks? The answers to these questions are subjective and will evoke different sentiments.

Let the Houses be recognised for what they excel at - be it sports, academics or co-curricular activities. With already enough recognition being given to each Inter House competition, the argument for a 'Cup of Cups' seems threadbare and unconvincing.

My Experiences Down Under

Ananya Shukla reflects on her exchange experience to Australia.

As I arrived back home in Delhi, I felt no regret going so far away from the comforts of home to the land of Kangaroos and Koalas. Diverse as it is, with its enticing mix of many different ethnicities, geologic landforms, and technologically advanced cities, Australia seemed to be a magical land that I was privileged to experience, during my exchange to Australia this summer.

This unforgettable experience was made possible through my two-month long exchange to New England Girls' School - NEGS - an independent, Anglican, day and boarding school for girls only, located in Armidale, a small city in northern New South Wales. From a place where people were sweating profusely in spite of the light cotton clothes for summer, I found myself in a place where people were preparing for bone-chilling winters just 24 hours away was initially a rather rattling experience.

The thought of the vast differences scared me at first, but I soon learnt exchange is all about adjusting to new environments with people from different cultures backgrounds. After studying in an all-boys school for four years, and having never been away from my parents for so long, I initially found it difficult to life at NEGS.

The day I reached, I found out that I had a room all to myself and there was another exchange student from India who was going to join the next day. Luckily she was someone I knew since the Daly College Conference, that I had attended in 2015.

At NEGS, I joined a few drama and textile classes apart from my curricular work; I was also chosen for their school band and got an opportunity to represent their school at a concert. The teaching methods at NEGS is pretty much similar to Doon's, except for the fact that they had more group work, more discipline and less writing in the class. There were no note books or files that had to be carried around by students. I found it very easy to cope up with studies because what they were studying in their class 10, wasalready covered by us in our classes 7 and 8. One of my favourite classes were the science lessons. Not because I'm a science student, but because whatever topic would be studied in class on a particular day, there would always be a related practical based activity in groups after the lectures which helped to better our understanding of the topic.

Apart from studies, NEGS has a very strong culture of sports. So I got an opportunity to play Hockey, Soccer, and Rugby (known as football in Australia) which I couldn't have played here with the boys.

Being a strict vegetarian, it was quite a challenge

getting good food at NEGS but I managed. There I realised the value of home food and even CDH food which most of the people here don't realise. Before coming back to India, I also got a chance to go to Sydney, where I stayed with a student's family.

At the end of my exchange, I'm glad and satisfied that I went to Australia and used every minute of my exchange in learning new things like rugby, netball, baking, designing a magazine and an Australian accent. Despite the obvious issues of adjusting to an entirely new lifestyle, I'm happy that I have made a great circle of friends 5000 miles away from home. Toodle-oo!!


