

Yasharth Goyal writes about the recently released Budget for the coming fiscal year

Unlike what we saw in July last year, Budget 2015 is filled with a plethora of reforms which the Modi government has been so desperately trying to bring about in the corporate sector. An indication of his commitment to giving this sector a boost and much needed investments is the massive cut in Corporate Tax rates and the complete abolishment of Wealth Tax. While many may criticize this financial reprieve for the "super rich" as being a reckless move, it will certainly provide the capital required for private sector investment in infrastructure and other developments that are in-line with Modi's electoral promises. As a discreet response to the non-cooperative Swiss banks, a relaxed taxation policy promises a notable reduction in the outflow of money to our friends in Switzerland and other tax havens around the world. The Finance Minister also mentioned a new, more stringent Tax Evasion law that bombards these evaders with penalties and increased jail terms that are strict enough to curtail the extradition of funds that has troubled India's economy for so long. With the additional inclusion of a more transparent property tax transfer system, it is clear that the government is prepared to tackle corruption and illegal land dealings with utmost severity, aiming to rectify the mistakes which plagued India's last government and ultimately led to its ousting.

However, Modi's announcements of populist investment reforms seem to have compromised on the social side of his electoral mandate. In his campaign for last year's General Elections, he boasted about the coming of 'good days' or *acche din*. However, he has hiked service tax to a rate of 14%, thereby painting a cross-hair on the back of the *aam nagrik*, on whose vote he rode to power, and who is also being made to pay for the corporate "comforts" that this budget has to offer.

In spite of all these pro-corporate reforms, I think the Budget will deliver. It is important to bear in mind that Finance Minister Arun Jaitley has not entirely neglected the poor. He has proposed to create a universal insurance policy for all Indians in the form of the soon to be launched *Pradhan Mantri Suraksha Bima Yojna*. This *Yojna* looks to provide an accidental cover of Rs. 2 Lakh for a premium of just Rs. 12 per year. But this policy could bring about the same problems that crippled the American economy recently. The Finance Minister also proposed to use unclaimed deposits of about Rs.3000 crores in the Public Provident Fund and around Rs. 6000 crores in the Employment Provident Fund for a senior citizen fund that will be used to provide subsidies for underprivileged farmers and pensioners. This socialist policy is not in consonance with the seemingly corporate friendly

government, but it will certainly earn them praise from the leftist quarters that have always been cynical of the Modi juggernaut. Another commendable aspect of the budget is the newly-

formulated disinvestment and Public-Private partnership scheme. The disinvestment target of Rs. 69,500 crores may prove to be an important aid in the bid to reach a growth rate of 8% in the near future. Jaitley's plan for the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act has taken not only me, but also the opposition, by surprise. His allocation of Rs. 5000 crores to the program, despite caustic remarks made in the past by the Prime Minister who viewed the program as a "living failure of the erstwhile UPA", has served to taunt the opposition, reminding the Congress of its failure in both governance and in the last few elections following their rule. While many may consider it simply a "troll" on the Opposition, it can be interpreted in two distinct ways: either Jaitley is committed to turning this policy paralysis into something of a success, or he and his Prime Minister are conscious of the fact that a welfare scheme of this sort, no matter how ineffective, cannot be done away with without an electoral price.

However sustainable, thoughtful and instrumental Budget 2015 may be, ensuring that it lives up to its tag of "*Sabka* Budget," is an uphill battle that will make even Modi sweat. Let us hope, for the sake of the nation, he comes out on the other side with not too many wounds on his famous 56-inch chest.



Die Neuer Meister

The Doon School Weekly interviewed Mr Anand Samak, who recently joined the School as a German Master

The Doon School Weekly (DSW): Can you tell us something about yourself?

Anand Samak (ASK): My name is Anand Samak, and I'm from Pune. Prior to joining Doon, I was a faculty member at the Goethe-Institute, an organization which promotes German language. I enjoy drama, music, German literature, traveling and socializing.

DSW: What brought you to The Doon School?

ASK: I had the privilege of knowing your exfaculty member, Mr. Dhanesh Joshi, who is also from Pune. While preparing to leave, he asked me if I would be his successor at Doon, to which I wholeheartedly agreed, as I had heard about the School's reputation in the educational world. I also felt that teaching in Dehradun would be an interesting experience, as it was in contrast to my previous job at a huge city.

DSW: What made you choose German over other languages?

ASK: I initially started learning German as a hobby. During that time, however, I became aware of the surprisingly numerous career opportunities that a person conversant in German could seize. This motivated me to continue my learning German, which then led me to the completion of my BA in the language.

DSW: Even though you have spent very little time here, what about School strikes you as being most unique?

ASK: In my opinion, it is the thirst for knowledge displayed by my students. In many other institutions, the desire to learn is poorly instilled into the minds of pupils, which manifests into subjects and classes being considered as dull or uninteresting. Though my classes are small, my students are always full of alacrity, which is what I feel is the most unique.

DSW: Being interested in music and drama, do you have any advice for our school's budding performers?

ASK: If you are truly passionate and willing to make compromises, then you will surely succeed. This is true not only for these activities, but for any holistic pursuit. Another thing: the importance of regular practice is paramount, for without doubt, it does make you perfect.

The Week Gone By

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
