

- 5. Virtual University Visit- You can also attend virtual university visits on <u>https://www.youvisit.com/collegesearch/</u> and <u>UCAS</u>.
- 6. Students to consider which areas of their chosen subject interest them most, and to search online for things they can read relating to these topics this can be anything from a non-fiction book to news articles to <u>scholarly literature</u>. And don't forget it doesn't always have to be about work!
