Halfway through Rest Hour, a Junior came running into our room. The Housemaster had called us outside the Common Room to meet our new Master-in-Charge. We sat on the quadrangle steps, eyes fixed on the Tata House Field, waiting for this mystery man.

At first sight, he looked like something straight out of a Nat Geo documentary. A tall, slender young man (not much older than an S Former himself) walked towards us faster than most boys could run, his giraffelike strides covering the field in seconds. "Hello there! My name is Ashad Qezilbash, from Lucknow," he said. "My initials are AAQ." His easygoing demeanor instantly put us at ease. AAQ radiated a happy, peaceful energy. After we introduced ourselves, we asked which Master's house he had been assigned. He pointed across the field to the corner house and asked if we wanted to come have a look.

To our horror, the house was totally empty. Besides a mattress on the floor and a toaster with a loaf of bread and a slab of butter, there was absolutely nothing else. Mr AAQ had clearly left Lucknow in a hurry.

But what struck us was how, despite having nothing, he opened his home to us like we had known him forever. Even though the house was bare, we felt comfortable and at ease. He even managed to satiate our limitless appetites with some warm makhan toast. The way he treated us on his very first day reflected his warm-hearted nature. We were over the moon knowing he would be our Master.

There was never a moment of awkwardness or formality that usually exists when meeting a new teacher. This was truly a transformative moment in my life — I had found a dear friend in my new teacher.

When I said he left Lucknow in a hurry, I wasn't joking. The man arrived, quite literally, with nothing but the shirt on his back. Nobody knows that better than me because I had to lend him my black home togs — something he, to this day, has not forgotten. He was to borrow them until his *samaan* arrived 'a few days later' by truck. Spoiler alert: The truck never came. Yet Sir very sweetly returned my pants on Golden Night.

In the following years, AAQ Sir blossomed. And as he grew, so did I, embracing valuable life lessons that shaped me into the person I am today. If I may share a few, they would be these — no matter what life throws at you, always have a big heart, lead with kindness and integrity, and most importantly, never change for anyone.

I was lucky to have AAQ Sir when I needed guidance the most. It is unfortunate that he will leave before my son joins Doon, but it gives me immense pleasure knowing that he stayed at Doon for over three decades, inspiring hundreds, if not thousands, of boys like me.

AAQ is one of a kind. There can never be another AAQ. But we can hope and pray Doon gets someone like him in the near future, someone who, too, can empower young minds with such joy.



Navigating Knowledge

Agastya Chamaria reports on the session about career options for the S Form.

The session for the S Form held earlier this week proved to be truly enlightening and provided insightful and applicable information on a plethora of subjects. Ranging from topics such as marine engineering and ocean dredging to diplomatic ties between India and Belgium, and the latter's contributions to the culinary world, Mr Bram Vanderpitte and Ms Babette Desfossez ensured that the session was especially engaging and undoubtedly memorable.

Mr Vanderpitte serves as the Managing Director of International Seaport Dredging Private Limited (ISDPL), a prominent subsidiary of the DEME Group, headquartered in Belgium. The DEME Group is a global leader in dredging and environmental projects, renowned for its innovative solutions and commitment to sustainable development. In his role at ISDPL, Mr Vandepitte oversees operations that are pivotal to enhancing maritime infrastructure, facilitating trade, and supporting economic growth.

His presentation included multiple videos on the live, on-site action of the DEME group's projects in Singapore and other port destinations around the world. We witnessed multiple visuals of grandiose and sophisticated machinery that the corporation has employed internationally to facilitate grand projects, such as the expansion of the Singapore coastline for trading purposes. He also announced its upcoming projects in Indian cities such as Mumbai and Port Blair.
